Here2Help

The Development Trust is now working in partnership with Age Concern Orkney, and is able to offer support to all residents of retirement age should they require it, as part of Age Concern Orkney's Here2Help service.

Here2Help can provide the following kinds of services: cleaning, changing bedding, laundry, ironing, preparing meals, local shopping, and many other tasks that you might find hard to do. Here2Help does not provide personal care services (for example, bathing, toileting, dressing, etc.), as these are already provided via other Home Help services.

The Development Trust is currently heavily subsidising this service, to ensure that the cost is kept low for those who need it - you will pay just £4 per hour for the Here2Help service.

Rousay Lap

We have begun preparations for the 5th Rousay Lap, which will be on Saturday 31st August 2013. We are in the process of applying to the BIG Lottery for funding to support this event.

Rousay Wi-Fi Centre

The Rousay Wi-Fi Centre is unfortunately still experiencing problems with connecting to the Internet. BT has again been contacted, and an engineer is to due to come here week commencing 29th April. We can only apologise for the delay in getting the Internet up and running. The computer and printer are both set up and available for non-Internet use when the GP room is open.

Broadband: Next Generation Access

We understand that Highlands & Islands Enterprise (HIE), BT & the Broadband Delivery UK Project have signed-off projects which are expected to bring superfast broadband to parts of Orkney. We are working closely with HIE to identify what this means for Rousay, Egilsay & Wyre.

Grant Applications and Education Bursaries

The Board would like to continue to encourage individuals and organisations/businesses to consider if they have a funding need that would meet any of our Development Plan targets (see our website for further information). If you do, please think about applying for a grant or loan from the Trust to cover these costs.

In addition to this, the Board has agreed to fund an Annual Bursary Fund for individuals wishing to partake in education, training or development courses during the 2012/13 academic session. This is for support towards the training costs only, on vocational or development courses or for professional qualifications. If equipment or travel/accommodation costs are a barrier to you starting a course, the Trust will consider contributing towards these costs under a separate application. Dear folk on Rousay,

Future of the Church of Scotland Congregation on Rousay

This is an open letter to everyone who is interested in preserving a Church of Scotland presence on Rousay. If you are supporting a different denomination or have a different faith or no faith, please allow us to use this space to reach out to those who may be interested.

At the end of March 2013 we conducted our AGM at which healthy accounts were presented to the congregation. The office bearers of Rousay congregation should be highly commended for their diligence, foresight and wise stewardship of the congregation's resources to make this possible.

For worryingly only three members of the congregation were present at the AGM and the general giving from attending services is also severely reduced. Many people in Scotland have forgotten that the Church of Scotland is not a government body but a private charity like the RNLI and thus self-funding!

Those who are carrying the responsibilities of running the affairs of the congregation on Rousay, which is its own charity, are getting older and also growing tired by the lack of encouragement and support from a larger group of Rousay people.

You may now say to yourself: well, why does THE CHURCH not send a minister to support us better? The church in each location is probably the oldest Community organization in existence. However we are now feeling the effect of younger people all over Scotland turning their back on church life.

At the moment there are 224 vacant posts in Scotland competing for just over a dozen people coming out of training. Add to this the age profile of ministers, which will mean a great deal of retirements over the next few years, and you will see that the CofS in 2030 may only be able to fill half the existing posts – unless something wonderful happens.

And as with other organizations like the NHS the outlying parts of Scotland find it much harder to attract people away from the central belt.

What can we do about this?

We need to remember that THE CHURCH is not an institution out there but that WE ARE THE CHURCH on Rousay; it is what we make of it!

We need to ask ourselves do we WANT a congregation on Rousay or are we happy for Rousay to be served by a mainland charge, when the need for a funeral/wedding/baptism arises.

In order to think about these questions and to discuss these matters the office bearers of Rousay Congregation and myself as Interim Moderator invite you to attend a public meeting for everyone interested on Sunday 19 May at 11.30am. We will have a short service followed by the meeting.

Hope to see many of you then!

Points of Interest: Communities & Families Fund

The Big Lottery Fund has recently launched a new programme in conjunction with the Scottish Government – the Communities and Families fund. This joint fund offers small grants (of between £250 and £10,000) to support projects working with young children (pre-birth to 8 years) and their parents.

Organisations can apply for a grant for a 12 month project that will meet at least one of the following outcomes:-

* Improve the quality of life of children (pre-birth to 8) through greater access to early learning, play and child maternal health support.

Letter from School Place

Since I last wrote, I have been away with my two youngest children (both in primary) for a week's horse riding in Lanark over Easter in the snow. I think we have all improved our cantering and jumping abilities, but I came back with the most aches.

At the Policy & Resources Committee meeting, webcasting was rejected in favour of podcasting on an amendment, preceded by an amusing speech (which deserved podcasting), by councillor Harvey Johnston. Councillors also approved the recommendation by the Constitutional Reform Working Group (of which I am a member) for Orkney to host this autumn a conference on constitutional reform involving OIC, Shetland Islands Council and Comhairle nan Eilean Siar (Western Isles Council). At this will be debated what constitutional settlement would be in our best interests. We shall also be engaging with the Scottish and UK governments and other relevant organisations, such as "Yes Scotland" and "Better Together". We intend to future-proof Orkney whatever the outcome of the 2014 referendum may be.

As reported in "The Orcadian" (11th April), the Development & Infrastructure Committee recommended that the proposed refit timetable for the outer North Isles be sent back to be discussed further by the Ferry Services Consultative Committee. On the 29th April the North Isles councillors and community council transport reps will be taking part in a workshop with officials out of which hopefully some improvements will arise to make this refit timetable a fairer one.

I have now been to my first community council meeting in Westray, and I accepted an invitation to attend the AGM of the Stronsay Development Trust. At the latter, I found myself accompanied by Mark Hull, with whom I had some interesting conversations.

A.G.M. and plant swap

Thanks to all those members who came along to The Annual General Meeting of the Rousay Allotment Association last month. The plant and seed swap was a great success, everyone went home with something new for their gardens.

NEW OFFERS

The new shredder machine has arrived and is ready to be hired out. It is suitable for shredding cuttings, seaweed etc to make a mulch or turn into compost for your garden. This will be available for hire for £10 a day, complete with extension lead, safety goggles and a collection bag.

We have also ordered hoops and cloche film to make your own mini cloches to protect vegetables from the Orkney wind. You can make up any length of cloche, depending on your requirements, prices on request.

Compost

As this was so popular last year, a new delivery of the free compost from the mainland will be delivered next week. This compost is not suitable for seeds, but ideal for potting on and bulking up beds. As we have to pay for delivery the cost will be 30p a bag or £11 a tonne scoop to cover this cost. Collect your own – inform me on 821479, pay either me, Will or Helen.

Allotment Spring Clean

There was a disappointing turn out for The Allotment Spring Clean Morning with only Will and myself turning up. We managed to clear up all of the winter bruck that has collected around the site, swept out the polytunnel and put down more carpet squares to protect the trees. Most of the trees are doing really well, including the new willow that we planted at the Community Tree Day last autumn.

Membership and fees

Membership fees and rent for plots are now due. If you have not paid please can you phone Helen at the Development Trust Office at The Manse on 821 229 to check when it is convenient to pop in.

Associate membership

Many residents have joined The Rousay Allotment Association to take advantage of the compost and equipment we have for hire including the new shredder. We also have other items for sale, full list on request. Associate membership is only £5 a year. If you would like to hire any of the equipment but cannot manage to do it yourself, we can arrange for someone to help you in your garden.

Equipment Hire

Members can hire the equipment from the Allotment Association. The prices are as follows: Rotovator - £10 a day plus fuel used. If you require someone to do the rotavating for you this will be £10 an hour for the man. Strimmer - £2.50 an hour plus fuel used. The trailer is available at £10 a day or £2.50 an hour. Shredder - £10 a day including a 15m extension cable. To book hire for any of the equipment contact Will on 821 479.

Article for the “The Review” from David Brown (Locum)

I grew up in Portsmouth, in the south of England, and on the whole had a very happy childhood. Portsmouth, as you know, is one of the main naval bases in the country, and so you could always see naval personnel from various places in the world walking round the nearby shopping centre. Sometimes my mother would invite some of these young men back to dinner if they were at the church service on a Sunday morning. And so over the years we met some really interesting people. Little did I know that I would later work for a mission to the Royal Navy founded by Dame Agnes Weston which is officially called the Royal Sailors Rest, but is better known these days as “Aggies”.

We were with this mission for three years before we returned to Africa, and had a very fulfilling and blessed time. Sometimes it was exhausting, because our centre (also our home) was open for most of the day to anyone serving in the Royal Navy. However there was always the joy of knowing that in some way you were making a difference to these young men and women. But more importantly was the knowledge that God was making a difference in these lives too.

We saw many of these sailors during the week as they used to come into the centre and make themselves a snack. There was always food in the fridge so that they could help themselves to whatever they fancied at the time. At weekends we would often take some of the lads with six canoe's down to Bournemouth where they would have the time of their lives, just relaxing and enjoying the day out.

There was also a children's camp held every year, and one year this was held in Wray Castle in Scotland. It was a long trek for everyone from the south, but well worth it. There were daily activities for all the children to do, and every evening we had a devotional time where we sang Christian songs and someone would then speak about a subject in the Bible.

At the end of every meeting the young people were given an opportunity to respond to what was being said. I will never forget one particular evening. The procedure was this. All the adults were responsible for their own dormitory and usually there were about six children in each. I had the worst behaved group. They were terrors.

At the end of the meeting we would go to our respective rooms and if any of the young people wanted to talk to someone about what they had heard, they could go to their own room where someone would be waiting there to see them. I went back to my room and waited. I didn't expect anyone to come, but there was a knock on the door. The first to come in was a young lad who was in tears nearly. He sat down and said he wanted to become a Christian. So we talked for a while and then we prayed together, and during that time he asked Jesus to be his Saviour. What happened next was incredible. I didn't know about this, but in his pocket he had some paying cards. On the reverse of the pack were pictures of nude women. He looked at me and said, “I don't want these cards any more, what shall I do with them?” I told him that there was a fire burning outside, and why not put them in the fire. This is what he did. He was about thirteen years old, and it reminded me that God can touch the hearts of young and old, and make a difference in their lives. After this two other young people asked Jesus into their hearts and lives.

That was just one of the many blessings we experienced during our time with Aggies.

At that time one of the Naval Officers that came to our Bible Studies was Admiral Sir John Hamilton. He was Commander in Chief of the Mediterranean Fleet during the Suez Crisis, and a lovely Christian. He told us once how he had become a Christian. Apparently his niece had visited him while he was stationed in the Mediterranean, and she had asked him if he was a Christian. “Of course I am”, he told her. I do so much for the naval personnel, and live as good a life as I can. But she looked at him and said, “But uncle do you know the Lord Jesus as your Saviour?” “Have you asked Him to forgive you for your sin and give you a new heart for Him?” He mumbled something but then the subject was dropped.

However, after she had returned to England, what she had said kept niggling him. Until ten day later when this man, this Admiral of the Fleet, knelt down by the side of his bed and gave his life to Jesus. He was transformed. After he retired you would often find him preaching in the local churches. He preached in our church once, and he was just full of the love of God, and longed that others would come to know him too.

This Admiral's niece had made a difference, and now her uncle was making a difference too.

I want to finish with a story. One day a man and his son went on holiday together. It was a seaside resort but on the first night it rained and rained. The weather was so bad that in the morning thousands of jellyfish had been washed up on the shore. As the boy and his dad walked along the beach early that morning, the boy jumped down off the promenade onto the beach and started to throw these jellyfish back into the sea. His father looked at him and said, “Son, why are you doing that. You won't make any difference, there's thousands of them.” The boy looked up at his dad, and throwing another jellyfish back into the sea, he said, “I made a difference to that one, didn't I dad?”

Well as we come toward Ascension Day and Pentecost Sunday, let's remember the great difference that Jesus made when he came to this world. He came to open up the way for each and every one of us to be reconciled with God. And today He's making a difference to millions of lives all over the world.

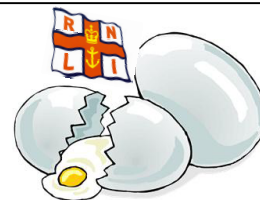
Just a question to close with. Has He made a difference to you?
